Wood Lane Mine Wheel

In the Spring Edition of the Parish Newsletter, we informed you that the Parish Council had objected in the very strongest terms to the Jones Homes' planning application to retain our mine wheel in its current erroneous location where it acts as a 'Welcome to the Beaumont Grange Development' and not, as it always had, as a 'Welcome to Treeton'. The objections which were put forward fully reflected the views of local residents including the 460 people in total who registered their own objections to the mine wheel, coal tubs and memorial stone (referred to below as 'The Memorial') remaining where they are currently positioned and not where they are shown on the planning consent for the development.

The Planning Board (RMBC) met initially in March to consider Jones Homes' planning application to retain the memorial in situ and to reorient only the mine wheel. The Planning Board at that time deferred its decision in order to ask that Jones Homes' and the Parish Council seek to find a mutually acceptable compromise regarding the positioning of the memorial. Treeton Parish Council has made repeated offers throughout to engage in discussions with the Developer and has suggested a potential compromise involving the full reorientation of the wheel to include the tubs and the memorial stone where it is currently sited but positioned where it would, once again, act as a 'Welcome to Treeton'. Sadly, this offer was rejected outright by Jones Homes'.

The Planning Board (RMBC) has since met and, having considered Jones Homes' refusal to fully re-orientate the memorial, has now rejected the planning application on the grounds that '*The repositioned and re-oriented monument fails to act as a gateway feature to Treeton Village as originally intended, reducing its visual impact within the streetscene and harming its historic context within Treeton Village'*. This being the case RMBC Planning has issued an enforcement notice requiring Jones Homes' to position the monument as shown on the approved plans (overleaf) for the Beaumont Grange Development.

We believe, however, that this position is not ideal as it is underneath the electricity pylon lines and it is also further away from the road than where it was previously located in an area which is currently scrubland. There is therefore real potential for the monument to be less visible from the road and its setting and appearance diminished. The plan below shows the position and orientation of the monument as set out in the planning consent and also the position where it .

was previously located as well as its current location as determined by Jones Homes'.

Sadly, it has become clear that RMBC Planning during the application stage of the development gave very little consideration to the repositioning of the monument and concentrated its efforts on the development itself. This is disappointing to say the least and it is why the Parish Council have tried so hard to engage with Jones Homes' to seek an acceptable compromise which positions the wheel where it is visible on entering the village and also enjoys an attractive setting.

Since the planning decision to reject Jones Home' application to retain the monument in situ and reorient only the wheel, Treeton Parish Council has written to Jones Homes' parent company, The Emerson Group, expressing deep concern over its failure to listen to what residents consider to be totally reasonable concerns. The reorientation of only the wheel would not present the monument as it deserves to be seen on entering the village or indeed its significance as a whole. We have been clear that Treeton residents feel let down by Jones Homes' repeated refusal to locate the monument appropriately given its very personal significance to the village's heritage and history.

We have taken the opportunity to remind the Developer that the mine wheel itself as well as the coal tubs are the property of Treeton Parish Council and not

Jones Homes' and that the memorial stone was funded by public subscription. We have stated in the strongest terms that residents of Treeton, and miners beyond, are very angry about the siting of the monument and Jones Homes' complete failure to appreciate the strength of local feeling about their treatment of what is our monument.

Just before going to press we have received a response from Mr P E Jones, Chairman of the Emerson Group of Companies, expressing his wish for 'an amicable agreement to settle this matter sympathetically'. This gives us some encouragement that a mutually acceptable agreement on the positioning of the monument may be possible. Discussions will take place over the course of the next few weeks between the Parish Council and senior representatives of Jones Home's.

Chairpersons Annual Report

The Parish Council has been busy over this last year taking on responsibility for our War Memorial site where we have undertaken much needed work across the whole site. We began by having our lovely memorial professionally cleaned and the lead lettering cleaned, repaired and repainted. Work continued with tree surgeons carefully addressing the overcrowded trees and shrubs followed by removal extensive deep rooted and invasive ivy, taking away two truck-loads of accumulated green waste. As I write work is beginning on landscaping and grass seeding with plans to make the best of the lovely York stone flags to create a paved area with seating to follow.

We have also undertaken improvements in the burial ground replacing 2 old broken flagged pathways with block paving, creating a screened tidy area by the vehicle access gate and tidied up the pedestrian entrance.

We continued with our summer planting and increased the number of flower holsters on the lamp posts across the village which I do know were very well received. The lit Christmas trees on lampposts also made a return and although I know they too were welcomed I shared your concern over the quality of some of them and that will be addressed for the coming December.

Fortnightly drop-ins continue in the Reading Room with Parish Councillor and Housing Champion surgeries, occasionally joined by Policy Community Support Officers and together I hope we are making a real difference and that we help to answer some of your queries and address your concerns around antisocial behaviour.

We continue to work in partnership with Rotherham Borough Council with a grant from them towards the seating in the War Memorial Gardens and their continued support for our work through the Public Rights of Way Partnership Scheme providing some funding towards our maintenance of public rights of way and other 'green' routes across Treeton.

The youth club led on our behalf by SJD Sports and hosted at the Community Centre remains very popular and it is a pleasure to see children and young people from the village and beyond enjoying a range of sport and craft activities. Sadly, we continue with the challenge of antisocial behaviour with off roading, litter and fly tipping, we are very grateful to our team of very conscientious litter pickers; you make a real difference to our village and your efforts are really appreciated.

Finally, I would like to thank Shaun Singleton for the work that he does cutting the 'green footpaths' and keeping spaces in the village clear and tidy alongside moving mountains of fallen leaves. He planted over 2,000 bulbs last autumn which were a cheerful sight as they flowered through the spring across our village.

Reading Room Project

As many of you will know very little has been done to the Reading Room for many years other than basic maintenance and it had started to look very dated and somewhat inhospitable.

With this in mind, over recent months the Parish Council has been taking steps to improve both the external fabric of the Reading Room as well as its internal appearance. The front of the building was recently re-pointed in keeping with its age and we then turned our attention to the interior.

With help from the services provided by 'Community Payback', whereby offenders carry out unpaid work on projects as pay back to the community, the whole of the interior has been repainted which has greatly improved its appearance. We have also removed the old 1960's kitchen and replaced it with a nice new and modern looking one.

We are very grateful to Gateford Mill Kitchens, Worksop, for their help in providing and fitting the new kitchen.

Within the next few weeks', we will complete the remaining work after which we hope to be able to make the Reading Room available for hire again as it used to be. More details are to follow regarding how residents can make use of the Reading Room.

Well Lane Playing Fields

Over 18 months ago the issue of Quad Bikes, Off Roading and Parking on the park were raised by the Parish Council with RMBC, who own and maintain the land.

An initial suggestion of knee high metal rails around the exterior was explored by RMBC, but nothing came of it.

The issue was again raised by the Parish Council in November and December following further incidents and the Parish Council enquired about any progress with the railings.



The Parish Council continued to press RMBC and the Ward Councillors for action to be taken, preferably the installation knee-high metal rails, throughout December and January. This included a wide variety of photographic evidence of the damaged caused just prior to the festive period.

The Parish Council were informed by RMBC that there was insufficient evidence that Quads/Off Roading were a problem and there were not enough funds available to pay for any metal railings.

Wooden posts were proposed and unilaterally installed by RMBC, despite the continued lobbying by the Parish Council.

The Parish Council have continued to request that RMBC fill the gaps at either end of the field where there a no posts and for additional measures to be taken to prevent vehicular access.

This is an ongoing issues and residents can support the Parish Councils efforts by reporting all incidents to SY Police and RMBC. If the Parish Council are also informed, they can raise it on residents behalf and use it as evidence of the need for further measures.

War on Litter

Litter continues to be a problem across the village, whether it be general littering in the street or fly tipping. There have been a number of reports of waste being 'dumped' around public waste bins. On one occasion, the Parish Council has had to intervene to remove waste around the bin on Washfield Lane.

We would like to remind everyone that waste bins on the highways are for rubbish from the footpaths, highways, Public Rights of Way and reasonable out of pocket waste, dog waste bags etc as the public walk past. They are not a place to put rubbish collected off private land.

It is important that instances of fly tipping are reported so that RMBC can collect the waste and patterns of behaviour/hotspots can be established. You can report litter and fly tipping on the RMBC website.

We are extremely lucky in Treeton to have a fantastic group of volunteers who are out litter picking on a monthly basis, there are even individuals, such as Roger Blades, who are out and about on a weekly basis.

Despite the efforts of this group of amazing volunteers, litter seems to be a growing problem. Roger commented 'I am not the only one who picks litter. There are group up to 20 folks who meet on the 1st Saturday of the month at the Community Centre. The litter is a problem all over the village. I will normally pick 3 or 4 bags every week from the central roads in the village most of that I am sure thrown out of car windows.'

The Parish Council have engaged with the Village School and its pupils will be designing signs for lampposts to encourage people to take home their litter and RMBC will be respraying the 'Pick Up or Pay Up' dog fouling signs on pavements.

Tackling Crime

The Parish Council have been aware of a number of reports recently of burglaries, attempted burglaries and thefts across the village, with many residents raising security and enforcement concerns.

Behind the scenes, the Parish Council have been engaging with key stakeholders and partners to look at what steps can be taken, including:

Mill Lane Steps

The Parish Council was approached earlier in the year by a resident about the lack of action taken to repair and restore the steps at the bottom of Mill Lane.

This project was raised over fours years ago with RMBC and little has been done in the interim to restore the steps.

After some investigation and a meeting between Parish Councillors and Residents on site, the Parish Council were able to apply pressure on RMBC to take action.

RMBC have in turn engaged with volunteers from the Ramblers who have done a great job in bringing the steps back into good working order.



Treeton Nature Diary

We will be resurrecting the old nature diary which featured in the old 'Treeton Community News' many years back and it will now become a staple in the new Village Newsletter.

Recent Changes to Treeton Wildlife

In this first diary will focus on the Treeton Parish and Treeton Dyke area. Most of the old tips are gradually turning to woodland and this has meant the loss of ground nesting birds such as Skylarks, Meadow Pipits and wading birds, these populations have been taken over by some of the more common songbirds and warblers. We have also seen a decline in butterfly numbers on the tips after a big increase back in the 1990s. We seem to have lost Cuckoo, Willow Tits and Tree Sparrows as nesting species and some once common species such as, Yellowhammer, Swifts, Swallows, Greenfinches are only present in much smaller numbers.

Since first recolonising the area back in the mid 1990s, Buzzards and Roe Deer had become regular and can be expected anywhere in and around the village. Sand Martins are also doing well along the Rother. Little Egrets now breed further down the Rother Valley and are often to be seen at any of the area's wetlands, throughout the year. There are now regular sightings of the larger Great White Egrets which are colonising Britain at the moment, and listen out for Ravens which often fly over the village and now nest in the Rotherham area. Holly Blue butterflies are now a fairly common sight in gardens and can easily be separated from the Common Blue, being much paler and always landing with their wings closed.

The increase in dragonfly species since the early 1990s continues with Small Redeyed Damselfly and Willow Damselfly being recent editions at Treeton Dyke. Some of the once common species such as Common Darter and Emerald Damselfly have declined. Still reports of Grass Snakes and Frogs in gardens, but along with newts they seem to becoming scarcer in the wider countryside. Its also good to hear there are still hedgehogs in and around the village and foxes can turn up anywhere. Common/Soprano Pipistrelles and Daubenton's Bats are common these days along the River Rother, Treeton Dyke and Catcliffe Flash, but Noctule Bats are not as common as in the past. Perhaps the biggest surprise is the now regular sightings of Otters even with young along the River Rother. They can be separated by their bigger size from the fairly common American Mink.

Issue 56

War Memorial Project

Work is continuing to take place on our War Memorial following the cleaning of the monument late last year along with substantial tree work to clear what had become a very over grown and under cared for area. As you are now able to see, removing a few of the larger trees has allowed the remaining ones to flourish. We hope you will agree that this has made a big difference to how the whole area looks.

More recently, we have been putting our efforts into removing the very extensive and invasive ivy roots which ran very deep underground and dominated the area. With these removed we have been able to grass the area which the Parish Council is now committed to maintaining so it stays looking cared for.



Earlier this year the Parish Council applied for and was successful in gaining a National Lottery grant worth \pm 7,000 part of which will go towards the re-laying of the original flagstones which over the years have become displaced and are in a poor state of repair. When this work is complete it is our intention to place one or two benches in the area so people can sit and enjoy the space.

This project still has some way to go. We want to address the state of the boundary fencing by replacing it, at least in part, with some laurel hedging which we think would be more in keeping with the area. This is still work in progress and we remain very open to receiving your comments and, in particular, any suggestions you may have for this space.

NEW BOOKING SYSTEM

The surgery is looking at a new way of working by using a clinical triage system. Hopefully this will take the pressure off the 8am rush to get an appointment and help ensure that patients needs are prioritised and dealt with accordingly. On calling the surgery you will be placed on a triage list and assessed by a clinician. You will then either be:

- Asked to book a routine appointment.
- Signposted to an appropriate service.
- Seen/Spoken to by a clinician.

Please Note: this is a new system so please be patient and kind to our staff.

<u>NHS 111 Online symptom checker</u> – unsure who the most appropriate service is for your problem? Check the NHS 111 online symptom checker, answer a few questions and they will advise whether you need to see a GP, A&E, Pharmacy etc.

Our practice Website & NHS choices offer self-help advice.

SMEAR APPOINTMENTS - available to book online (nurse clinic)- only book if you have received an invite from the surgery or from cervical screening. If you are not due for a smear this will be discarded by the laboratory.

Telephone and Face to Face appointments – If you have a face to face appointment please arrive in time for your appointment. If you arrive late the clinician has the right to mark you as a DNA and ask you to rebook. For Telephone consultations please ensure you are available within 30mins before and after your appointment time as we cannot guarantee you will be contacted at exactly this time due to delays. We have had to remove online booking for GP's and ANP's due to inappropriate bookings which then leads to wasted appointments.

ADVANCE NURSE PRACTITIONER – Our ANP can deal with headaches, chest infections, sore throat, sinusitis, diarrhoea, abdominal pain, heartburn, sickness, uti, thrush, gout, new neck or back problems, acne, eczema, rashes, warts, verrucae, impetigo, bites, in growing toenails, allergic reactions, hay fever, asthma attacks, medication reviews. Not appropriate for pregnant ladies or Mental Health issues.

Rotherham Hub services include Physio appointments, Advanced Nurse Practitioner & GP telephone Bookable through Rotherham Health APP. Self-referrals to Ear Care, Continence and Mental Health Services.

Mental Health Practitioner – We now have a practitioner who can help with your Mental Health Needs. These appointments are available to book via the Surgery.

Please try to ring after 10am if your call is relating to anything other than appointments.

Did Not Attend (DNA's)

Whilst we understand things crop up which may mean you cannot attend your appointment, we would appreciate it if you could call to cancel your appointment with as much notice as possible so we can offer it to someone else who may need it.

Telephone Appointments

When booking a telephone appointment we cannot guarantee a set time, we are trying to advise patients it will be a morning or afternoon telephone call, however if you have access to online booking this will show as a set time – this is for surgery use only so please keep your phone handy!

<u>Annual Reviews – i.e Asthma, Diabetic, Medication</u>

We are changing the way we call people for their annual reviews. You will now be called in your birthday Month, but it may mean you get 2 reviews in the 1st year. These reviews are an important way of monitoring our patient's health and ensuring the correct care and advice is given. Please ensure you book your appointment when you are invited.

Rotherham Health App

Did you know you can use Rotherham Health App to send us non urgent messages, contact details updates, extend sick note request, prescription queries, referral follow-up requests using the forms section in the app.

SystmOne Online
