Welcome to the Autumn Newsletter

Welcome to the Autumn edition of the Treeton Parish Newsletter in which we reflect on our activities over the summer months and tell you about some of the events which are up and coming later this year.

June saw the arrival again of the colourful hanging baskets on lampposts on the main routes through the village. Despite the rain they have continued to bloom and have put on quite a show!

In July we were able to lift the flagstones on the War Memorial, removing the broken concrete ones and relaying the beautiful old York Stone. I think this latest work together with the re-seeding of the surrounding area has really transformed the appearance of our War Memorial site. We are now in the final stages of this refurbishment project which will include adding a memorial bench and some further landscaping of the site.

In the previous edition of our Newsletter, we included a detailed report on our negotiations with Jones Homes on the repositioning of the mine wheel, memorial stone and coal tubs. These discussions are taking much longer than we would have wished but at the same time we recognise the importance of getting the Monument to





Treeton Miners in a position where it acts as an appropriate 'Welcome to Treeton'. Further details of where we are with this are inside.

You will recall that towards the end of July we distributed a leaflet to each household on the actions we have taken in response to residents' concerns about crime levels, particularly relating to domestic burglary and car thefts. These

concerns were first discussed at the open meeting on 29th June with the Police & Crime Commissioner, our local MP, Police and others. There will be a further Community Meeting on Wednesday 20th September in the Baptist Chapel starting at 6.30pm at which the actions we have taken and other initiatives we are exploring will be shared and discussed with residents.

I am pleased to tell you that the refurbishment of the Parish Reading Room is now complete and it is looking really well! It is available for hire by residents and details are included inside and on our website.

Finally, I would like to thank Eve Levin, who has resigned from her position as a Parish Councillor, for her valuable work and contribution to the village. We wish Eve well.

Wood Lane Mine Wheel

In our last Newsletter we reported comprehensively on our efforts to date to get our mine wheel, memorial stone and coal tubs (referred to below as the Memorial) removed from their current erroneous position to one where they act, as they always have, as a 'Welcome to Treeton'.

It is fair to say that these discussions have been on-going for much longer than anyone would have wanted and sadly the location of the Monument remains unresolved as we go to press. The Parish Council has consistently objected in the strongest terms to the Memorial's current position because it clearly serves as an entrance to the Beaumont Grange Development and is barely visible when entering the village. Our view and that of residents is that this is simply unacceptable.




We advised you in our last Newsletter that Jones Homes had previously submitted a retrospective planning application to retain the memorial in its current position. The Planning Board when it first met to consider the application asked Jones Homes to consider, in conjunction with the Parish Council, the full reorientation of the Memorial to include the brick and stone structure. Sadly, Jones Homes refused to do this and the planning application was refused on the grounds that 'The repositioned and re-oriented monument fails to act as a

gateway feature to Treeton Village as originally intended, reducing its visual impact within the streetscene and harming its historic context within Treeton Village'.

RMBC Planning subsequently issued an enforcement notice requiring Jones Homes' to position the monument as shown on the approved plans for the Beaumont Grange Development and in response to this Jones Homes has indicated that it may appeal against this decision.

The Parish Council has always had serious doubts about the position of the Memorial as shown on the planning application. It was felt that this position is too far from the road and therefore the memorial would not be sufficiently visible. These doubts have been well founded as in the last couple of weeks Jones Homes has removed all the overgrown vegetation from the entire area where the Monument is shown on the planning application and it is has become very clear that its visibility on entering the village would be substantially diminished and the Monument would not have the setting and prominence it deserves in reflecting the village's heritage and history.

Sadly, the memorial will never have the roadside prominence it once had because the land it stood on was owned by the Duke of Norfolk and sold to Jones Homes for the housing development. The Parish Council had no opportunity to



buy that part of the site and do not own any land in that area and so we continue to work hard with Jones Homes who do own the land to try and get the best possible outcome.

In the last Newsletter we informed you that we had written to the Chairman of Jones Homes parent company, The Emerson Group, expressing our concerns over Jones Homes failure to listen to the reasonable concerns of residents over the current siting of the monument. The response we received was that it was the Chairman's wish for 'an amicable agreement to settle this matter sympathetically'

To date this has not been possible, however, the Parish Council has a further meeting with Jones Homes in September when we will ask again that the Memorial and its entire structure be reoriented at its current site by 90 degrees so that it faces the road on entering the village and where, once again, it would act as a 'Welcome to Treeton'

We remain hopeful that we might yet be able to persuade Jones Homes that this is the right thing to do for our village but are also mindful that should our efforts be unsuccessful and Jones Homes succeed in any appeal the Monument may well remain in its current position in its entirety. Alternatively, if an appeal is lost Jones Homes may be required to relocate the Monument to the position shown on the planning application which, as we have indicated above, is far from ideal.

We will continue to seek 'an amicable agreement to settle this matter sympathetically' and to get the Monument located in the best position we are able and where it is displayed in a fitting setting given the mine wheel, memorial stone and coal tubs all belong to the village and for which the Parish Council is the custodian.

Once we have further information we will announce on our Facebook Page and Website.

Tackling Crime

In July we issued a special edition of the Parish Newsletter in response to residents' concerns, which were raised at a community meeting held in the Baptist Chapel on 29th June, over the increase in crime within the village, particularly domestic burglary and car theft. In the special edition we advised you of the numerous actions that were taken following the community meeting and here below are a few updates on some of these actions:

- The Police are now undertaking regular police patrols in the area.
- We provided in the July Newsletter advice on ways to contact the police and the contact details for the Neighbourhood Policing Team (NPT).
- The police have now included Treeton in the burglary hot spot patrol plan.
- The PC has supported and co-ordinated the introduction of a Treeton Wide Neighbourhood Watch Scheme which many residents have already joined.
 Rachel Rowbottom, your Neighbourhood Watch Coordinator and Parish Councillor gives further information about this on Page 21.
- The mid-week 'Drop Ins' held in the Reading Room which are attended by the Police, Parish Councillors and representatives from RMBC have been extended to include dates at weekends and evenings to allow residents to raise concerns or seek advice outside usual working hours.

- The PC and Neighbourhood Watch has met with colleagues in Woodsetts where CCTV has been installed to explore the benefits and the potential impact CCTV can have on crime levels. This will now be considered further by the full Parish Council at its meeting in September.
- The PC at its last meeting in July received a presentation on potential Private Security Services, which was suggested by residents at the public meeting. We

are currently considering advice on the legality and overall feasibility of such services.

The PC has organised a further **Community Meeting which will be held in the Baptist Chapel, Station Road, on 20th September commencing at 6.30pm until 8pm** at which these and other initiatives can be discussed with residents. We hope many of you will attend as we want to hear your views.

Reporting Crime

We continue to urge all residents who are victims of crime to report the incident to the police. You should also report anything you see that you feel is suspicious.

When to call 999

- When there is a threat to life; this includes road traffic accidents where people are injured, the road is blocked or a vehicle involved in the accident has failed to stop.
- Violence to a person or damage to property is imminent.
- A serious offence is actually in progress.
- A suspected offender is still at the scene of a crime.
- When any delay in reporting the incident may prevent the apprehension of an offender.
- When serious disruption to the public is currently taking place or, is likely to take place.

When to call 101 (non-emergency)

- To report a crime that is not currently taking place and the offender is no longer present.
- Where your call is a routine enquiry.
- To make an appointment to attend an enquiry desk.
- Requests for advice or to provide information.
- Lost and found property enquiries.

Report a non-emergency incident online through the police online portal

As an alternative to 101, you can report your non-emergency incident on the police online portal.

War Memorial Project

During the summer and thanks to a National Lottery grant we were able to take up all the flagstones on the war memorial site many of which had become displaced, some broken and the area was generally in a poor state. We got rid of the cracked concrete pavers and retained all of the wonderful old York Stone and re-laid it to create a lovely space. We have re-seeded the surrounding area and over time, and with the necessary care, it will look better and better. We will be planting plenty of spring bulbs and in the course of the next couple of weeks will be placing a lovely wooden bench in the area where we hope residents can sit and enjoy the surroundings.

This project is now in its final stages, over the autumn we will be working on the hedging and doing some further planting and then in the spring we look forward to seeing colourful bulbs in full bloom.

The War on Litter

Litter, Fly Tipping and Dog Fouling continues to be a problem across the village and reports of overflowing bins, household waste being left next to bins and a variety of litter being left on the villages Playing Fields have continued to be passed to the Parish Council.

You may have seen, in July, that the 'Pick Up or Pay Up' dog fouling signs returned to the pavements in key locations. Although these signs will not stop everyone from leaving their dog waste for others to deal with, it is hoped that it will encourage owners to act more responsibly and pick up!

The Parish Council has also been working with Rotherham Borough Council and Treeton C of E Primary School on a further project to encourage residents and visitors to the village not to drop litter and clean up any dog waste.

Children from the school were asked to design their own signs for lampposts across the village. The four designs shown, were the winning designs, and they will be put on lampposts on the following streets - Treeton Lane, Mill Lane, Station Road, Treetown Crescent, Church Lane, Rother Crescent, Washfield Lane, Wood Lane, High Hazel Rd, Well Lane, Bole Hill, Arundel Street.



Neighbourhood Watch Update



We're delighted to be able to tell you that Treeton Neighbourhood Watch now has a team of 3 co-ordinators – Katie, Rachel and Tracy. The scheme currently has 168 members from across the village which represents around 10% of households.

If you're not already a member, please join up using the QR Code, click on find my local scheme and select the Treeton Scheme. Neighbourhood Watch is only as good as its members, the more of us that are in it, the better we can be!



It's very important that all crime is reported to the Police, unless it's reported they don't know about it and can't allocate appropriate resources for Treeton. Crime happening right now should be reported using 999 as always, non-urgent matters can be reported online Report something - SYP (southyorks.police.uk) or by calling 111. Where possible, it would be helpful if you could also inform us as your neighbourhood watch co-ordinators of any crimes or suspicious behaviour. You can do this by replying to any emails we have sent. If members do not report crime/ suspicious behaviour to us, we cannot inform other members or possibly identify any patterns of behaviour.

There is some very useful crime prevention information on the Neighbourhood Watch Website, you don't have to be a member to view it and can be found using this QR Code.



You may remember from the Security Meeting held by the Parish Council back in June that Woodsetts Neighbourhood Watch had arranged to have CCTV installed to try help reduce crime rates and make residents feel safer. Your NW coordinators recently met with the co-ordinator of Woodsetts Neighbourhood Watch who was extremely helpful, and we are now exploring CCTV options for Treeton. The cameras in Woodsetts were paid for mainly by fundraising activities and Crowdfunding donations. We would also need to pay for cameras and of course will be making applications for any grants for which we may be eligible, but will also need to raise additional funds in the same way as Woodsetts. Please watch out for fund raising activities in the coming months!

The Parish Council has a second **Security Meeting scheduled for 6.30 pm on 20th September at Treeton Baptist Church**. While the Parish Council are running these meetings we won't hold separate Neighbourhood Watch meetings, however the intention is that in future we will hold at least quarterly face to face Neighbourhood Watch meetings.

In addition to the Security Meeting on 20th September, the following crime update drop ins will be held at the Reading Rooms in Treeton:

Treeton Nature Diary

Unbeknown to the villagers of Treeton, this September marks 50 years since the start of monthly wildfowl counts at Treeton Dyke and Catcliffe Flash Nature Reserve. In September 1973 the late John Lintin Smith started this task, until I took over in the early 2000s.

Originally counts were made Sept to March and since 2009 most months are covered. These are the only two sites in Rotherham, where continual counts have been kept up. Around the middle Sunday of each month a count is made of all the swans, geese, ducks, rails, grebes, cormorants, herons, waders, kingfishers, gulls and terns at most UK waters and estuaries. These records being sent to the British Trust for Ornithology, for analysis.

Over these 50 years 39 species have been recorded at Catcliffe Flash and 40 species at Treeton Dyke. In the early 1970s both waters held little in the way of water birds, probably as some shooting historically took place at both localities.

Generally, numbers have increased over the years.

By the late 1970s at Catcliffe Flash, high numbers of wildfowl were being recorded, becoming one of the top sites in the Sheffield and Rotherham areas. Mallard, Teal, Pochard and Tufted Duck being particularly numerous. In recent decades these species have declined, but increases have been noted in the numbers of Wigeon, Gadwall, Coot and Little Grebe. Reasons for these changes are complex, but Pochard and Tufted Duck seem to prefer the new lakes at Orgreave, Gadwall, Wigeon and Coot feast on the plentiful American water weeds that have taken over the Flash.

Wigeon 143 – 2020/21, Mallard 252 – 1985/96, Shoveler 31 – 2003/04, Teal 280 – 1991/92, Gadwall 93 – 2021/22, Pochard 180 – 1986/87, Tufted Duck 102 – 1998/99, Goosander 61 – 1996-97, Moorhen 30 – 1997/98, Coot 209 – 2006/07, Little Grebe 19 – 2022/23, Blackheaded Gull 753 – 1997/98.

At Treeton Dyke water skiing keeps the numbers low, but wildfowl increase during winter as little skiing takes place. In the past many of the Pochard and Tufted Duck from Catcliffe Flash travelled to feed on the Dyke at night. It would be the mid 1990s, before the Dyke held any significant numbers of wildfowl. Counts of Mallard, Gadwall and Coot soared from around 2006, but have tailed off in recent years due to regular disturbance by wild swimmers and paddle boarders through the winter months. The southern part of the Dyke is owned by Rotherham MBC and is supposed to act as a wildlife sanctuary, away from the disturbance caused at the northern part of the Dyke by recreation activities, but this is no longer the case. The small numbers of the wary Goldeneye have been particularly affected.

NEW BOOKING SYSTEM

The surgery is looking at a new way of working by using a clinical triage system. Hopefully this will take the pressure off the 8am rush to get an appointment and help ensure that patients needs are prioritised and dealt with accordingly. On calling the surgery you will be placed on a triage list and assessed by a clinician. You will then either be:

- Asked to book a routine appointment.
- Signposted to an appropriate service.
- Seen/Spoken to by a clinician.

Please Note: this is a new system so please be patient and kind to our staff.

<u>NHS 111 Online symptom checker</u> – unsure who the most appropriate service is for your problem? Check the NHS 111 online symptom checker, answer a few questions and they will advise whether you need to see a GP, A&E, Pharmacy etc.

Our practice Website & NHS choices offer self-help advice.

SMEAR APPOINTMENTS - available to book online (nurse clinic)- only book if you have received an invite from the surgery or from cervical screening. If you are not due for a smear this will be discarded by the laboratory.

Telephone and Face to Face appointments – If you have a face to face appointment please arrive in time for your appointment. If you arrive late the clinician has the right to mark you as a DNA and ask you to rebook. For Telephone consultations please ensure you are available within 30mins before and after your appointment time as we cannot guarantee you will be contacted at exactly this time due to delays. We have had to remove online booking for GP's and ANP's due to inappropriate bookings which then leads to wasted appointments.

ADVANCE NURSE PRACTITIONER – Our ANP can deal with headaches, chest infections, sore throat, sinusitis, diarrhoea, abdominal pain, heartburn, sickness, uti, thrush, gout, new neck or back problems, acne, eczema, rashes, warts, verrucae, impetigo, bites, in growing toenails, allergic reactions, hay fever, asthma attacks, medication reviews. Not appropriate for pregnant ladies or Mental Health issues.

Rotherham Hub services include Physio appointments, Advanced Nurse Practitioner & GP telephone Bookable through Rotherham Health APP. Self-referrals to Ear Care, Continence and Mental Health Services.

Mental Health Practitioner – We now have a practitioner who can help with your Mental Health Needs. These appointments are available to book via the Surgery.

Please try to ring after 10am if your call is relating to anything other than appointments.

Did Not Attend (DNA's)

Whilst we understand things crop up which may mean you cannot attend your appointment, we would appreciate it if you could call to cancel your appointment with as much notice as possible so we can offer it to someone else who may need it.

<u>Telephone Appointments</u>

When booking a telephone appointment we cannot guarantee a set time, we are trying to advise patients it will be a morning or afternoon telephone call, however if you have access to online booking this will show as a set time – this is for surgery use only so please keep your phone handy!

<u> Annual Reviews - i.e Asthma, Diabetic, Medication</u>

We are changing the way we call people for their annual reviews. You will now be called in your birthday Month, but it may mean you get 2 reviews in the 1st year. These reviews are an important way of monitoring our patient's health and ensuring the correct care and advice is given. Please ensure you book your appointment when you are invited.

Did you know you can use Rotherham Health App to send us non urgent messages, contact details updates, extend sick note request, prescription queries, referral follow-up requests using the forms section in the app.

SystmOne Online

You can now send the admin team online messages, these should only be non-urgent queries e.g. sick note request, general advise, referral follow up etc.
